

Flexible enough to change with you as you learn




Deep enough to learn something



Research questions have smaller questions!




George C. Marshall Library Question Matrix





Differences Between Quality vs. Scholarly

Quality Resources

- * Written by a journalist or reporter
- * Checked by editors
- * Mass readership
- * Popular / everyday vocabulary
- * Usually no prior knowledge necessary
- * Use to build your background knowledge

Scholarly Resources

- * Also called academic resources
- * Written by an expert
- * Peer reviewed - checked by experts
- * Higher level analysis
- * Vocabulary used by experts
- * Written with the expectation of prior knowledge

Should I use Quality or Scholarly?

Quality

- * developing your question
- * building your background knowledge


Scholarly

- * answering your question
- * supporting your thesis / assertion




